It is an honor and privilege to present the Cabarrus County annual report on behalf of County staff and the Board of Commissioners. This document serves a compilation of achievements, strengths, budget highlights and more for Fiscal Year 2023-24 (FY24).

The FY24 Adopted Budget placed a strong emphasis on retaining County employees, attracting top talent and funding education needs.

County employees are the backbone of this organization. When we invest in them, they are driven and empowered to provide the best customer service experiences for our residents.

FY24 employee investments included accelerating the review of market data for all position salaries from a four-year to a two-year cycle, funding pay adjustments recommended by the most recent market data study for more than 150 employees, awarding longevity payments to employees with at least five years of continuous service to the County and increasing the on-call pay rate.

During FY24, the County experienced the completion of many projects, such as the Frank Liske Park Barn reopening and EMS Headquarters grand opening. We also broke ground on exciting new projects like the upcoming hybrid library/active living centers in Mt. Pleasant and Afton Ridge.

As Cabarrus continues to grow, the County remains committed to our employees and the community we serve.

In FY24, Cabarrus County updated its strategic plan. The initiative began with a Board of Commissioners (BOC) conversation that signaled a renewed appreciation for County staff and their dedication to providing residents with the best possible service. - Commissioners are elected on a partisan basis serving four-year staggered terms, with new members (two or three) elected every two years
- The governing board is responsible for, among other things, passing ordinances, adopting the budget, appointing committees and hiring the county manager, clerk to the board, tax administrator and county attorney
- The County Manager serves as the chief executive and is responsible for carrying out the policies and ordinances of the governing board, overseeing day-to-day government operations and supervising the heads of various departments





#### From Data to Dialogue

Real Property Manager Michelle Seaford and Real Property Supervisor Steve Morehouse never know what each day will bring. They might start the day in the field, performing on-site property visits for appraisals and appeals before ending it in the office, conversing with residents about property values


Michelle, Steve and the rest of the team worked tirelessly on the County's 2024 revaluation, spending more than two years collecting and analyzing data through field visits, aerial images and more.

In total, the department appraised more than 97,000 properties and analyzed about 42,000 transactions

During a revaluation, the County reviews property values based on the market and economic conditions to bring assessed values in line with the worth of the property as of January 1 of the revaluation year.

While State law says that revaluations must occur at least every eight years, Cabarrus County follows a four-year cycle (as recommended by the Department of Revenue).

The process of evaluating property relies on a mountain of analytical data, but Michelle's 35-plus years of service to Cabarrus County has proven that there's a simple formula for success: open communication between the County and property owners.

Resource Conservation Easement Specialist Amy Cook is passionate about protecting farmland. She's so passionate, she made it her career.

Amy and the Soil & Water
Conservation team work to
protect and preserve irreplaceable
landscapes in Cabarrus County
through conservation easement
agreements. These voluntary,
legal agreements with landowners
ensure that properties can never be
modified into anything but farmland
and/or forestland through deed
restrictions.

Easement agreements offer wideranging benefits, including the protection of open spaces, wildlife, water and natural resources as well as the preservation of historic agriculture use. These protected spaces also absorb rainwater, which is crucial in managing and preventing flooding.

Amy grew up around agriculture and knows firsthand the importance of protecting farmland. Or as she would describe it, protecting what makes Cabarrus County special.

#### **EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES**

#### **A New Home for Life-Saving Care**

On September 13, 1995, **Emergency Medical Services Chief Jimmy Lentz** first met his future wife Janet
Andrews under a large oak tree overlooking the event stage at the old Cabarrus County Fairgrounds.

Now, almost 30 years and two kids later, Jimmy's office sits a couple hundred feet from where that old tree once stood.

For years Lentz and the EMS crew dreamed of having a facility to manage operations, logistics, training, administration, crew wellness and future growth—all under one roof.

That dream became a reality in the fall of 2023. The new 30,000-square-foot facility on Cabarrus Avenue West opened with ample training space, a modular lecture hall, multiple conference rooms, a fitness center, large ambulance bays and more.

The centrally located building is now a hub for the 160-plus EMS staff serving the ever-growing Cabarrus community.

The building helps the award-winning department level up even more, thanks to an advanced, immersive training area.

Simulation rooms allow for real-world experiences. The spaces can be set up like bathrooms, wreck scenes and other realistic environments paramedics might encounter on calls. The rooms also have complete recording capability for post-training analysis.

While Jimmy and the EMS department have come a long way since that fall day in 1995, they're excited to set a future course in their new headquarters.





#### DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICES

#### **The Value of Preparation**

The opportunity to help save a life can happen at any moment. **Social Worker Anna Green** knows that all too well.

Anna used her County-mandated CPR training to help save an infant. The incident happened in December 2023 while she was conducting a home visit. Anna was downstairs talking to a child when the mother, who was upstairs with an infant, began to panic over the baby monitor.

The mother rushed downstairs with the infant, who was having a seizure. The baby's eyes had rolled back and she was biting her tongue. At one point, the girl stopped breathing.

Anna immediately began chest compressions. The baby regained her breaths moments before EMS arrived.

Relief washed over Anna when the infant began crying and kicking her legs. The baby was rushed to the hospital and is doing well now.

Prior to working for Cabarrus, Anna was CPR certified as a daycare worker. She participated in the County's mandatory CPR training with EMS just days before the incident.

The County requires the training so when situations arise, people are equipped and ready to provide care.

Those around her call Anna a hero. She says she's just glad she was able to help in the moment.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH DEPARTMENT

Behavioral Health Director Dr. Kamilah McKissick is passionate about providing behavioral health care to all who need it.

Dr. McKissick, a licensed psychologist with decades of experience, is leading efforts to usher in a new era of behavioral healthcare in Cabarrus County, including the construction of a new Regional Behavioral Health Center.


The center will include a Behavioral Health Urgent Care, a Child and Adolescent Psychiatric Residential Treatment Facility and a Facility-Based Crisis program.

The County has established the Behavioral Health Department to focus on community partnerships and care navigation for residents. Dr. McKissick leads the department, following Dr. Aalece Pugh's promotion to Assistant County Manager.

Dr. McKissick's greatest hope for the center is to provide innovative services under one roof and a central resource for treatment and healing.

The planned opening for the center is early 2026. That year marks a full decade since the Cabarrus County Board of Commissioners first formed the Mental Health Advisory Board, which highlighted the need for local services and launched a variety of efforts.

Dr. McKissick is excited to be at the helm of this full continuum of care for residents. She truly believes that access to quality behavioral healthcare should be available to all.





#### **ACTIVE LIVING AND PARKS**

#### **Jack's Rule: Everybody's Welcome**

Park Ranger Jack Rule has a nickname for the Frank Liske Park Barn. He calls it "the mecca."

That's appropriate, as Jack sees people come from near and far to experience the barn. He sees them admiring the structure itself, taking in stunning views of Frank Liske Park from the huge windows, practicing yoga, meditating, falling in love and more.

The current barn opened in August of 2023, after the original was destroyed in an intentionally set fire. At the ribbon-cutting, more than 200 community members gathered to celebrate the culmination of three-and-a-half years of hard work to rebuild and restore the special place.

Nestled within the picturesque landscape of Frank Liske Park, the barn stands as a testament to the enduring bond that unites the Cabarrus community. It features kitchens on both floors, air conditioning, large rental spaces, elevator access, private bathrooms and public exterior bathrooms.

Originally, the facility was used as a dairy barn by Stonewall Jackson Training School. When Cabarrus opened Frank Liske Park on June 4, 1982, the barn became a gathering place that hosted thousands for reunions, weddings and other celebrations.

In fact, Jack and his wife, Melinda, held their wedding reception at "the mecca" in 2007.

The new barn is already providing unforgettable memories to new generations. Stop by to take it all in. Jack looks forward to seeing you.

#### For the Love of Books

Talk to **Library Assistant Angela Love** for any amount of time and you'll notice two things: an infectious smile and a pure joy about her job.

She also brings a special talent to the job: some might call her a book doctor. She gives books a fresh life so more patrons can enjoy them.

Angela is one of only two people that repair books at the Concord branch of the Cabarrus County Library System. She sees repairing as challenge—cutting the right amount of glue to hold the spine, hunting torn, weathered pages and neatly replacing those beyond repair. It's one of her favorite activities during a busy day when she also performs at story time, mans the information desk and reshelves books.

The County currently operates five library branches, with new Mt. Pleasant and Afton Ridge combination libraries and active living centers under construction.

The mixed-use facilities will house all the resources Cabarrus libraries offer, including a wide variety of books, information, materials, programs and resources along with the total wellness services offered by the County's Active Living Centers.

Angela is excited for the future. She believes these new facilities will open doors for new library patrons and create a fresh opportunity for residents to connect with County services.





#### **CONSTRUCTION STANDARDS**

#### The Code to Collaboration

**Codes Enforcement Officer David Carden** believes in timeliness.

David and the Construction Standards team work tirelessly to provide building inspections and permitting services for all areas within Cabarrus County.

Their goal is to begin every inspection the following business day from when the request was received. That's important for customer service and resident relations. As David says, if a resident takes a day off from work, he wants to make sure the team is there for them, to honor their time and not hold them up.

That's only possible with the help of a strong team. From his first day on the job, David realized the team atmosphere at Cabarrus County was unlike anywhere he'd ever worked.

That teamwork led to a record—in just one week during FY24, the team completed 1,793 inspections. A regular week does, on average, 1,455.

David says his department member's diverse backgrounds in public and private sectors and different specialties make for a great collaborative environment. That shows in the department's service to residents and businesses of Cabarrus County.
